



Critical Factors in Advising



Successful advising missions require:

- · A keen focus on Adaptive Challenges
 - Vice Technical Problems
- Understanding gained through Trust and Commitment
 - Trust is a prerequisite to gaining real Understanding and Insight
 - Commitment and Longevity are required to build Trust
 - > True understanding only comes from working on the ground, over time, in close collaboration with the Partner
- Non-U.S. Solutions for Enduring Change
 - > U.S. Solutions only work for Americans, usually
- Calibration with the Partner's Operational Reality
 - > A Partner's 'Strategic' challenges are often operational or tactical for the U.S.

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- 1. A MoDA is a technical expert...
 - Who can be an executive coach and mentor
 - · Not a liaison, consultant, or tutor
- 2. Who builds relationships and...
 - By demonstrating Empathy, Humility, and Respect
 - · Forms a true Partnership, dedicated and on the ground
- 3. Leverages those relationships to...
 - Identify the root of the problem or capability gap
 - Facilitate/catalyze the Partner's problem solving effort
- 4. Facilitate Enduring, Local Solutions that Build Partner Capacity.

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Ideal Advisor Characteristics



- · Willing to go "outside the wire"
- Empathetic and intuitive
- Strategic thinker
- · "Outside the box" thinker
- Comfortable with Ambiguity
- Flexible and Adaptable
- · Resilient and Resourceful
- · Sense of humor
- Can develop and maintain vertical and horizontal relationships
- Can operate both independently (selfstarter) and on a team
- Can write and brief at the executive level



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
Students are trained and educated on a variety of subjects, including:

- Country/Region-specific Language Instruction
- Special Topics such as Counter Insurgency, Hybrid Warfare, Communication in High Risk Settings
- Operational Readiness and Personal Security
- Guest Speakers provide perspective and support, including former Commanders, Resolute Support; Director, DSCA; related Deputy Assistant Secretaries of Defense; authors, and others
- Program Learning Objectives are reinforced through vignettes, role playing exercises, and structured feedback using After Action Reviews and other tools

Strategic Mindsets (Appreciating Strategic Purpose and Constraints)


- Ability to balance U.S. and Coalition/International equities with counterpart's desires

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MoDA Training Development



- MoDA Advisor Fundamentals and Operational Readiness (AFOR) and Advanced Advising training is standard for all missions, worldwide.
- Country study, language training, mission preparation, and exercises are customized based on the in-country assessment, mission analysis, and candidate evaluation.
 - Country-specific History, Culture, Society, and Politics
 - Language Instruction
 - Special Topics such as Counter Insurgency and/or Hybrid Warfare
 - Office Calls and Guest Speakers provide Perspective and Insight
 - DoD and Inter-Agency Senior Leaders
 - DoD and DoS Desk Officers and Program Managers
 - Training vignettes and role playing exercises are customized
 - Mission specific operational tactics, techniques and procedures
 - Task specific knowledge and skills
 - Country specific Language, Customs and Courtesies
 - Operational Readiness & Personal Security is augmented as appropriate

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- 1. Nomination: Initial definition of the Requirement
 - a. Problem Statement, Identify the Capability Gap
 - b. Partner and Mission Receptivity?
 - c. U.S. Goals and Objectives
- 2. Position Description
 - a. Translate the Requirement to a Recruiting Tool
 - > Identify the required Knowledge, Skills, and Abilities
- 3. Scoping Mission: Confirm the Requirement
 - a. Assess the Environment
 - b. Understand the Partner
 - c. Finalize the Position Description
- 4. Recruitment
- 5. Candidate Mission: The Final Interview
 - a. Assess the Candidate in the Environment with the Partner
 - b. Identify Training and Deployment Requirements
 - > Gain the understanding needed to match the person to the job.

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MoDA Mission Analysis focuses on the following:

- What is the required technical expertise?
 - What is the real gap?
 - What assistance is being provided by other means?
- What is the counterpart's style, approach, and receptivity?
 - Who are they?
 - How do they operate?
 - Are they really interested in having an advisor?
- What is the operational environment?
 - Permissive or non-permissive?
 - Supportive or non-supportive?
- What are the living conditions and expatriate lifestyle?
 - Quality of life, schools, safety, cultural/historical opportunities, etc...

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Successful establishment of an advising mission requires an expert assessment, in-person, on the ground.

- > Facts come to light and issues are easily clarified
 - You can learn more from a 15 minute meeting than a 150 page dossier
 - Assessing the Candidate in the Environment with the Partner is the true measure of compatibility
- > Forces rigor and ensures realistic analysis
 - A critical management control
 - Forces timely decisions
- > Establishes critical relationships
 - U.S. internal relationships, as well as those with the Partners
 - Can catalyze actions and leverage the Partner

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
